Here are a few tips on how to use this resource:

- **I recommend you use this after completing a draft.** I created this after I reread my novel. I was so overwhelmed by the different plots, and I knew there were inconsistencies and problems, but I didn't know how to identify them all together. This chart was a really helpful way for me to compile the problem and immediately come up with solutions.
- **It's meant to help you with writer's block!** It's easy to tell what's not working in a story. It's harder to come up with solutions. One of my favorite writing tips for writer's block was to list 10 things that can't happen and 10 things that could. Even if it doesn't make sense right away, it could be the magic solution!
- **Keep this in an easy-access place.** I printed it out and taped it into the primary notebook I was using. I loved being able to refer to it whenever I needed to.
